 Not quite, Titus, we are on the Via Domitia, a very long road that connects Italy to Spain, passing through all of southern Gaul.

The markers you see there let us know where we are, the name of the next town, and also the number of steps we have left to go.

Look, we can even see who placed this marker!

Understanding Latin!

Information in Latin is engraved on the marker that you can see on this page, but also in front of you in the museum. Here is the translation in English:

"Emperor Augustus, son of Divine Caesar, Great Pontiff, Consul for the 12th time, Consul Designate for the 13th time, acclaimed Emperor 14 times and holder of the Tribunician power for the 20th time."


How exciting! All the inhabitants of Nemausus rush to the amphitheatre, as a day of shows is taking place. Let's hurry!

Magistrate Sextus Adgennius
Macrinus, a friend of my father.
He invites us to sit next to him,
in the front row.
While he and my father talk,
I am amazed by the games taking
place in front of me: hunting, death
sentences and gladiatorial combat.
The amphitheatre is smaller

We have a meeting with the Great

than the one in Rome, but here the whole city can watch the show.

After this intense day, we leave the amphitheatre very quickly and walk along its monumental façade.





Look up and admire the decorations that were on the walls of the amphitheatre in Nîmes. Do you recognise the animals?



Looking more closely, you will see Romulus and Remus, the founders of Rome, under its belly. However, this one is a little different from the one found where I live. It's up to you to find the difference and circle it!





After a lovely day of celebrations, and as is customary, Sextus invites us to his home.



His domus* is enormous! We walk to his tablinum** The place is well decorated, we can see that he is part of the elite.

The door opens onto a huge mosaic! I am surprised by the style of this decoration. Sextus explains to me that he brought craftsmen from Africa. Nemausus is full of surprises!

The centre of this floor tells the story of Agave, who, struck with madness by the god Dionysus, killed Pentheus, her own son. This is the first time I have seen this scene on a mosaic.


I have the same dishes at home – they are found everywhere in the Empire – but now the Gauls are masters in the field.


The potter's seal**, the sigillum, is on the bottom of the cup and shows who made it.

work. But I will be able to continue developing my knowledge.


Like them, I always have my super tablet covered in wax, and my stylus, ready to engrave. You can see one here. With its end I can even score things out if I make mistakes.




Game #6

We head towards a small altar to pour wine and place fruit on it, but the decoration surprises me.

There are two different images, do you recognise them? Yes, a thunderbolt and a wheel! These are the attributes of the god for whom we are going to make offerings. Here, there are two

attributes on a single altar because there are many gods in the Empire – more than 200 – so sometimes several are merged into a single deity: this is called syncretism. In front of us is an altar to Jupiter Taranis.



Game #7

The wheel is the attribute of the Gallic god of the sky and storms, Taranis. Its metallic sound on the paving stones is reminiscent of the rolling of thunder.

The attribute of Jupiter, the Roman god of the sky and its elements, is lightning.


